

Information for parents and carers

about the Child Safe Standards

Child safe organisations

When your child is in the care of an organisation you want to know that they will be safe from abuse. The Child Safe Standards are designed to prevent child abuse in organisations.

The Child Safe Standards apply to over 50,000 Victorian organisations that provide services or facilities for children. These include:

- · schools and outside school hours care
- · kindergartens and early learning centres
- sporting clubs and recreational groups
- coaching or tuition services
- out of home care services
- local councils
- religious and faith-based organisations
- hospitals, health and disability services
- professional babysitting services
- overnight camps for children.

How do the Child Safe Standards protect my child?

The Standards require organisations to take actions in a range of areas, including:

- background and suitability checks of staff and volunteers
- codes of conduct for staff and volunteers
- training and supervision of staff and volunteers
- documented risk assessments for activities
- clear procedures for reporting and acting on any concerns or allegations
- commitment to listening to children and encouraging them to speak up if they don't feel safe.

Children have a right to be safe. Organisations have a responsibility to protect children from harm.



How do I know if an organisation is meeting the Child Safe Standards?

You can look on their website or talk to the staff. The organisation should have documents like:

- Child Safe Policy or Statement of Commitment to Child Safety
- Code of Conduct for workers and volunteers
- information about how to raise safety concerns.

Some questions you could ask include:

- What are you doing to meet the Child Safe Standards?
- Do you have risk assessments for activities?
- Do your staff and volunteers have appropriate checks, training and supervision?
- What are you are doing to encourage children to speak up if they feel unsafe?
- Who can I to talk in the organisation if I have a concern or complaint?
- What is the process if I raise a concern or complaint about child safety?

You have a right to talk to organisations about how they are keeping your child safe from abuse. If you are concerned that an organisation is not keeping all children safe or is not meeting the Child Safe Standards, take action.

What can I do if I am not sure my child is safe?

Take action if you are concerned that an organisation is not keeping your child or other children safe.

Talk to someone senior at the organisation. Tell them what you are worried about and try to find a solution together.

If the organisation does not address your concerns, contact their regulator. If you are unsure who the regulator is, you can contact the Commission. The Commission has information about regulators because we work with them to ensure compliance by all organisations with the Standards.

How do I ask my child if they feel safe?

Below are some examples of questions you can ask your child, changing the wording depending on your child's age.

- Do you know that you should always feel safe, no matter where you are?
- What do you like about [the organisation]?
 Is there anything you don't like?
- Have you ever felt uncomfortable, worried or not safe? Who would you talk to if you feel unsafe?
- Has anyone at [the organisation] ever talked to you about what they can do to make you feel safe?
- Do the staff listen to you and the other children?
- What do you hope will happen if you tell someone you don't feel safe?

Noisy instruments, props, learning actions to songs and working with a partner is a wonderful way to explore Music and Dance. Playing Social games in Room 8 is hilarious. No cheating is the rule because being a good sport is the name of the game.

In weekly Cooking sessions everyone gets to touch, eat or explore different foods. Following a recipe helps develop reading skills, extends new language and teaches independent living skills in a functional way. Everyone is eager to have a turn so practicing communication and using their counting skills to measure out quantities is key. Never mind if it gets messy the class helps to clean up afterwards.

A new opportunity for Room 8 this term focuses on learning about community access. The class can't wait for excursion to Mill Park All Abilities Playground to practice gross motor development using familiar equipment as well as exploring new ones too. Inflatable world is all about jumping and bouncing, using equipment safely and taking turns with others.

It's wonderful to see Room 8 students happy as they learn.

The Speech Pathology team has continued running a variety of group work sessions this term. Our students loved the ANZAC themed bucket when participating in the Attention Autism program. One exciting experience was the poppy watering activity. Students shared their attention by enjoying the scattered tissue poppies and the green water.

Some students have also been working hard on their phonics skills during literacy sessions. The team has used a multi-sensory approach, for instance, incorporating playdough and plushie letters, to make learning fun.

This term, the Speech Pathology team has also run a Parent Workshop, focusing on helping parents to support their child's communication at home. Parents were able to practice using AAC (Alternative and Augmentative Communication) in a variety of activities that could easily be transferable to home and the community!

Mad about Science Incursion

Students from the Reservoir and Norris Bank Campuses enjoyed participating in exciting activities based on the topic of the weather.

Our students learnt:

- how weather changes because the air in the Earth's atmosphere is always moving and changing.
- how clouds are made of condensed water vapour and how the water vapour in the clouds cools and condenses forming rain drops.

They observed a stimulation of a tornado and saw an exciting demonstration of an instant cloud in a bottle. It was a fantastic hands-on incursion that ended with a water rocket fly high into the air! It was fantastic to see our students volunteering and engaging in all the activities.
